

RFP FAQs

1) Is a budget required?

No, a detailed budget is not required. The RFP indicates the budget expectations. You may provide information about your proposed budget in the financial section of the proposal. You may choose to attach a budget to help provide additional information.

2) Are there upfront costs?

These are reimbursement-based projects. As such, the project sponsor would request reimbursement on a monthly basis for the expenses that have been incurred.

3) Do you need to submit two separate proposals if you propose both the RRH and CE components of RFP 18-5?

You may either combine into one proposal or submit two separate proposals. If you respond in one proposal, you should make clear the differences in staff and service delivery for each component.

4) For RFP 18-5, can a DV Bonus project serve homeless victims of human trafficking?

HUD considers human trafficking, including sex trafficking, to be "***other dangerous or life-threatening conditions that relate to violence against the individual or family member***" under paragraph (4) of the definition of homeless at **24 CFR 578.3**. As such, HUD will consider an individual or family to be homeless under that definition where an individual or family is fleeing, or attempting to flee, human trafficking that has:

1. Either taken place within the individuals or family's primary night-time residence;
2. Made the individual or family afraid to return to their primary night-time residence; and the individual or family has no other residence; or
3. The individual or family lacks the resources or support networks to obtain other permanent housing.

4) Can a DV Bonus project serve victims of human trafficking?

HUD considers human trafficking, including sex trafficking, to be "***other dangerous or life-threatening conditions that relate to violence against the individual or family member***" under paragraph (4) of the definition of homeless at 24 CFR 578.3. HUD will consider an individual or family as homeless under paragraph 4 of the definition under the following circumstances where an individual or family is fleeing or attempting to flee human trafficking that has:

- (1) either taken place within the individuals or family's primary night-time residence;
- (2) made the individual or family afraid to return to their primary night-time residence; and the individual or family has no other residence; or
- (3) the individual or family lacks the resources or support networks to obtain other permanent housing.
