
## Homeless to Housed: Speeding the Process

A goal of the 200 in 100 Campaign is to identify barriers to rapidly housing chronically homeless people who are living on the streets or in emergency shelters. Through the June 26 and 27 Boot Camps held in New Orleans, our community has done just that. We are reducing the time it takes to house vulnerable people. One key program, Rebuilding Communities, has set a goal of reducing the housing process from 102 days to 30 days.



*Boot Camp participants strategize how to move people from the streets to permanent housing in 30 days.*



## "The apartment was just meant for him": Housing a homeless person in a single day



Augusta Stewart, a Housing Specialist at UNITY, met Mr. Charles five days ago, but he will remember her forever. When Mr. Charles, a chronically homeless man, met Augusta he explained to her where he wanted to live. She already knew what her next steps would be. In preparation for the meeting, Augusta had contacted multiple landlords and was able to show Mr. Charles an apartment that afternoon. She could tell it would pass inspection and knew the landlord had worked with other formerly homeless clients before. At her request, the apartment was thoroughly cleaned, and the next day, with a smile on his face, Mr. Charles signed the lease for his own apartment. **Congratulations, Mr. Charles!**
